The Business and Professional Services sectors serve clients in different capacities such as legal and representation; accounting, bookkeeping, and payroll; engineering and specialized design services; computer services; advertising services; translation and interpretation services; and research services. The Financial Services sector primarily engages in financial transactions that includes the creation, liquidation, or change in ownership of financial assets. The three (3) principal activities identified within the finance & insurance sector that involve monetary management include: raising funds by taking deposits; pooling of risk by underwriting insurance and annuities; and providing specialized services or supporting financial intermediation, insurance, and employee benefit programs.

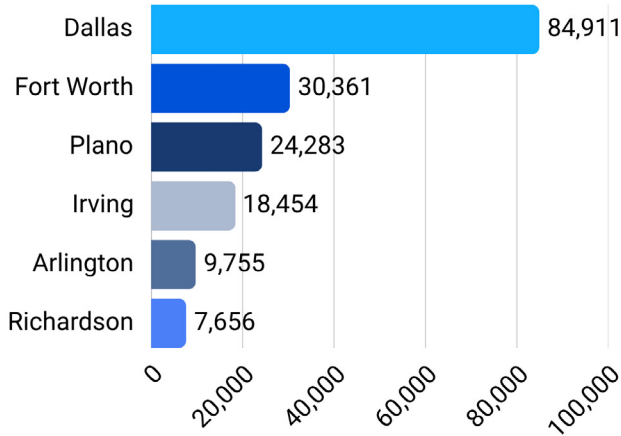

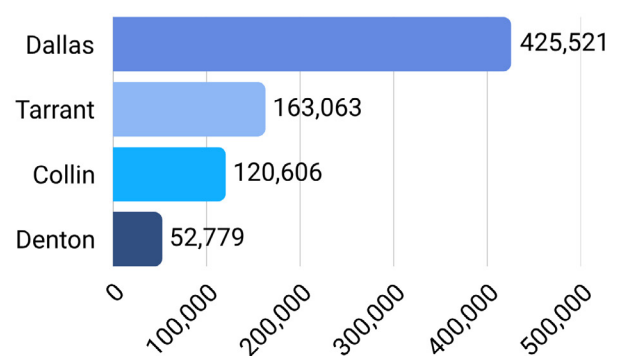
