The Transportation sector includes businesses that provide transportation of passengers and cargo, warehousing and storage for goods, scenic and sightseeing transportation, and support activities related to modes of transportation. Modes of transportation are air, rail, water, road, and pipeline. Industries in the Logistics sector, related to the distribution of goods, provide services such as labeling, breaking bulk, inventory control and management, light assembly, order entry and fulfillment, packaging, pick and pack, price marking and ticketing, and transportation arrangement. Establishments providing logistics services always offer warehousing or storage services.

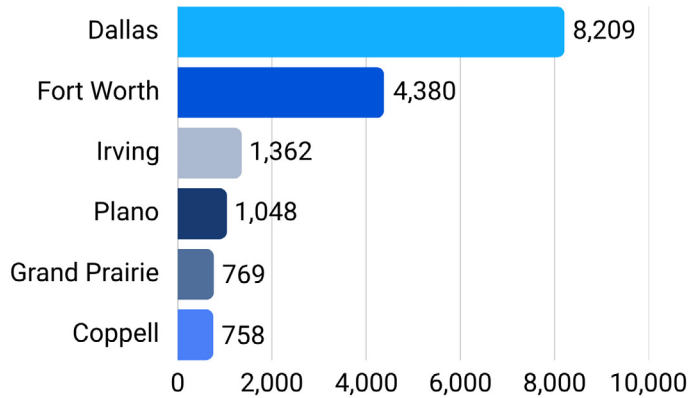

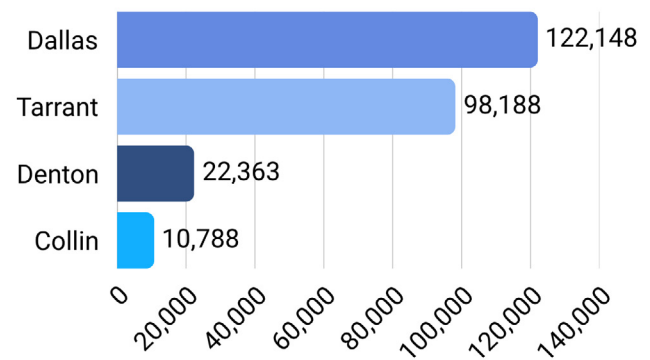
