



Workers in the Creative Art, Entertainment and Design field would likely **benefit from upskilling** into higherwage jobs. Common transitions in the DFW workforce demonstrate opportunities for advancement through education and training, creating a career ladder to living wage employment.





Forecasted annual growth for MIT-affiliated occupations is estimated at **3.9%** in the Dallas-Fort Worth region. Most entry-level roles do not require bachelor's degrees. In fact, skills training, certificates and associate degrees are advantageous for entry and advancement in the job market.



Manufacturing and Industrial Technology jobs are with notable companies in Dallas—Fort Worth, and more than 50% of students who graduate out of MIT programs work within MIT occupations.





Forecasted annual growth for Law and Public Service-affiliated occupations is estimated at 5.4% in the Dallas-Fort Worth region. Jobs such as paralegals and legal assistants saw average monthly hires estimated at 419 in the Dallas-Fort Worth region within the last year. Additionally, Dallas County had an estimated 22,000 Law and Public Service-related job postings.

Forecasted annual growth for educationaffiliated occupations is estimated at 5.6% in the Dallas-Fort Worth region.

Education or educationrelated occupations in the region have a median annual wage of \$54,700 compared to the nation's median annual wage of \$52,000. For all occupations in DFW, the median annual wage is \$42,900.



Education workers have opportunities to upskill to living wage employment, mostly in other education-affiliated occupations. However, some library roles can lead to occupations outside of education. Common transitions in the DFW workforce demonstrate opportunities for advancement through education and training, creating a career ladder to living wage employment.



Learn while you work: Most in-demand positions may not constitute full-time work and earn less than a living wage salary, such as tutors, child care workers, teaching assistants or substitute teachers. However, opportunities exist to earn a wage while obtaining a teaching degree.

Dallas College offers a Bachelor of Science in Early Childhood Education (BAS ECE) in addition to an Associate of Arts in Teaching (AAT) designed to lead to an initial Texas teacher certification.

These jobs have a low automation risk and sometimes have on-the-job training available.
